

The antonym of the word “religion”, and how the two relate to just about everything

Where “holy” means “making whole”, “diabolical” actually means “splitting in two”. The word that is truly an antonym of the word “religion” carries a similar connotation. Words like “wholesome”, “holistic”, “holy”, “angelical”, “constructive”, “religious”, and “Gnostic” are related to one another. In the same way, words like “unwholesome”, “atomistic”, “unholy”, “diabolical”, “destructive”, “irreligious”, and “agnostic” are related to one another.

The first set of words are related to the word that is the basis of the word “religion”. This word is the Latin word “religare”, which means to tie up, to unite, to bind together. The second set of words are related to the word that is the basis of the antonym of the word “religion”. This word is the Latin word “scindere”, which means to cut, to split, to tear apart, to divide, to separate.

What is the word that is related to the Latin word “scindere”, as the word “religion” is related to the Latin word “religare”? Well, the word is “science”, believe it or not!

Just as the word “religion” is related to things that are wholesome, holistic, holy, angelical, constructive, religious, and Gnostic, the word “science” is related to things that are unwholesome, atomistic, unholy, diabolical, destructive, irreligious, and agnostic. Do you see the nearly obvious connection?

One must note that the word “Scientology” is said to be related to the word “religion”, but the word itself comes from the Latin word “scire”, which means to know or distinguish, and the word is also related to the Latin word “scindere”, which means to cut or tear apart.

Religion is about bringing humans and things together, so it is essentially holistic. Science is about separating humans (as political science often does), breaking things apart, so it is essentially atomistic.

There are also a pair of thermodynamic/biochemical terms that have similar meanings to the words “science” and “religion”, and these terms are “entropy” and “syntropy” respectively. Entropy is a term used to describe a degree of disorder; energy in this case is generally released or dissipated. The opposite term is syntropy, and life is an example of syntropy. Our body appears to create more complex molecules from simpler ones, greater order rather than greater disorder. It should also be noted that enzymic, two-way reactions which precede in one direction in the human body, do not occur simultaneously in the same location as those that precede in the opposite direction. Biodegradation (entropic) reactions are separated within the body from biosynthetic (syntropic) reactions. In general, two-way reactions do not act together in humans except in pathological cases, so biodegradation/biosynthetic or entropic/syntropic reactions occurring simultaneously are a sign of illness or pathology, not wellness or apithology.

Another word that is related to the same Latin word “science” is related to is a four-letter word starting with an “S”, which in English means “excrement”. The word s@&# in modern English derived from the Old English nouns “scite” and the Middle Low German “schite”, both meaning “dung”, and the Old English noun “scitte”, meaning “diarrhoea”. “Scite” can trace its roots back to the proto-Germanic root “skit-”, which comes from the Indo-European root “skheid-”, which stands for “split, divide, separate”. Thus the four-letter word starting with an “S”, which in English means “excrement”, is distantly related to “schism”, “schist”, and even “science”.

So the human body, and anything that makes the human body wholesome or healthy, anything that is syntropic/biosynthetic, is religious in nature. Think of the living “body” of Christ. Anything religious is about integration, greater order rather than greater disorder.

That which comes out of the human body as waste, and anything else that makes the human body unwholesome or ill, anything that is entropic/biodegrading, is scientific in nature. Anything scientific is about disintegration, greater disorder rather than greater order.

So you should not bother to bring religion and science together, since they are in fact things that are separate by nature, as the healthy human body should be kept separate from its wastes.

You also should not bother to bring naturopathy/holistic health and medicine/surgery together, since they are in fact things that should be separate.

As a Great Master once put it, keep your pearls separate from your pigs. There may also be environmental dimensions to this discussion, but I’ll leave that to the reader to ponder upon.

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
